5 Red Flags

Spotting a scam starts with knowing what to look for—and what to avoid.

- You must pay to apply or unlock access
- There's no clear company name, contact info or history
- All testimonials feel vague or fake—no dates, no details
- You're asked to act fast, with “limited slots” or countdown timers
- They promise income without effort (spoiler: that's not how work works)

is worth the risks.**

What Real Online Work Looks Like

If it's genuine, online work has clear markers that set it apart from scams.

- You're not the product, you're the contributor
- No upfront fees: real clients pay you, not the other way around
- You can ask questions, get answers, and read real reviews
- There's no secrecy: legit opportunities are transparent by design
- There's effort involved — but there's also fairness and growth

**Scams are shortcuts.
Real work isn't.**

How to Protect Yourself

Basic steps to safeguard time, money, and information.

- ✓ Google the name + “scam”
- ✓ Check domain age on who.is
- ✓ Be suspicious of Gmail-only contacts
- ✓ Never send money to “verify your identity”
- ✓ Use escrow or platform protections (Fiverr, Upwork, etc.)

Platform	What It's Good For	Tip to Use It Safely
Fiverr	Skill-based gigs & services	Always vet the seller or buyer
RemoteOK	Developer & writing jobs	Filter by "non-recruiter" tags
Appen / Telus	Microtasks, training gigs	Avoid third-party clones
Upwork	Freelance contracts	Use milestone-based contracts
We Work Remotely	Remote companies & digital sales	Promote only verified products with clear reviews
